World Autism Awareness Day

The LPD recognizes World Autism Awareness Day every year by participating in the Light It Up Blue campaign. On April 2nd at 7:30 PM, LPD officers pulled over to the side of the road and activated the lights in their cruisers for 60 seconds.

The Lowell Police Department also hosted an Autism Awareness and Acceptance event at the Lowell Senior Center on Tuesday, April 5th. During the event, the LPD sold autism awareness patches to benefit the Doug Flutie Jr. Foundation for Autism and accepted registrations for the Safe Watch Program. The LPD Safe Watch Program allows residents to enter information about their loved ones with a disability or another condition that can enhance the tendency to wander from safe environments. Information, such as physical characteristics or favorite locations, can then be used to immediately begin a search in the event an individual goes missing. National Peace Officers Memorial Day

In 1962, President Kennedy proclaimed May 15 as National Peace Officers' Memorial Day and the calendar week in which May 15 falls, as National Police Week. Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962, National Police Week pays special recognition to those law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others. On May 15th, LPD Officer S. Sauve and Officer C. Larocque placed a wreath in front of the Christos G. Rouses Memorial in honor of Patrick F. Leavitt (EOW 12/18/1941), George F.A. Pearsall (EOW 4/24/1957), John Joseph Winn (EOW 5/3/1971), Christos G. Rouses (EOW 11/17/1978), and all other law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty.
