

Lowell Police Department 2018 Crime Report

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- CAD entries decreased 6%, from 98,034 in 2017 to 92,478 in 2018.
- Disturbance Calls decreased 3% in 2018 from 5,224 in 2017 to 5,065 in 2018.
- Highest call volume is Monday—Friday 0900-1859, and weekends 1700-0159.
- NIBRS crime decreased 13%, over the 5 year period.
- NIBRS crimes increased 12% when comparing 2018 (7,841) to 2017 (7,025).
- In 2018, officers arrested 3,212 persons, this statistic represents a 3% decrease over the 5-year period.
- LPD officers filed 27,381 incident reports in 2018, which is a 7% decrease over the 5-year period.
- 12,774 Field Interviews were filed by officers in 2018, which is a 10% increase over 2017.
- Officers issued 17,728 citations in 2018, this statistic represents a 1% increase when compared to 2017.
- In 2018, there were 4 Homicides in the City of Lowell, 3 by means of a firearm, all gang involved.
- 2018 Forcible Rape (n=22), this number represents a 15% decrease over the 5-year period.
- 2018 Robbery (n=105), this statistic indicates a 43% decrease over the 5-year period and a 27% decrease when compared to 2017.
- 2018 Robbery by type: Street (71%), and Commercial (29%).
- 2018 Aggravated Assaults (n=189), represents a 49% decrease over the 5-year period, and a 36% increase when compared to 2017.
- Approximately 39% of the Aggravated Assaults were Domestic-related.
- Aggravated Assaults primarily took place in the Acre, Centralville, Lower Highlands, and Downtown neighborhoods, on Platoon 3.
- 2018 Burglary (n=348), this statistic represents a 12% increase over the 5-year period and a 27% decrease when compared to 2017.
- Burglaries primarily took place in the Centralville, Highlands, Downtown, and Back Central Neighborhoods; 40% were into homes that were not secured or listed as unknown entry.
- 2018 Car Breaks (n=281), this number represents a 57% decrease over the 5-year period and a 34% decrease when compared to 2017.
- Car Breaks primarily occurred in the Acre, Centralville, Highlands and Downtown neighborhoods, during the overnight hours.
- 2018 Vandalism (n=751) **statistics represent** a 32% decrease over the 5-year period and a 13% decrease when compared to 2017.
- Vandalism primarily occurred in the Acre, Centralville, and Downtown neighborhoods.
- 2018 Drug Arrests (n= 243), all categories decreased with the exception of Possession (+11%).
- 2018 Opioid Overdoses (n=435), this number represents a 7% decrease when compared to 2017.
- 2018 Opioid-related Sudden Deaths (n=53), this number reflects a 15% increase when compared to 2017.
- 2018 Domestic related offenses (n=3,461), which represents a 5% increase over the 5-year period and a 4% decrease when compared to 2017.
- Domestic Assaults decreased 1% when compared to 2017.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY CONTINUED

- In 2018, Four Corners* had 225 CAD entries, of which 93% were for Missing **Persons**. Riverview had a total of 71 CAD entries, of which 80% were for Missing **Persons**. The GRIP** program had 419 CAD entries with 88% for Missing **Persons**.
- Officers arrested 145 Juveniles in 2018, a 17% decrease when compared to 2017.
- In 2018, 140 incidents took place in Lowell schools, which is a 73% decrease when compared to 2017.
- In 2018, there were 121 incidents involving a firearm; a 42% decrease over the 5-year period and a 13% decrease when compared to 2017.
- Officers recovered 107 Firearms in 2018, 13% of those found illegally in possession of a firearm were suspected gang members and 23% had a drug nexus.
- In 2018, Shots Fired/Discharging (n=55) increased 2% when compared to 2017.
- Thirteen people were non-fatally shot in 2018, 9 of these incidents were gang-related.
- There were 11 homes struck by gunfire, 9 of which were considered to be gang-related.
- Shootings primarily occurred between 1900-0400, Wednesday-Sunday in the Acre, Highlands, and Lower Highlands neighborhoods.
- In 2018, gang incidents (n=320) increased 8% when compared to 2017.
- In 2018, Officers arrested 198 suspected gang members and associates.
- Gang-related violence primarily occurred in the Lower Highlands, Acre, and Centralville neighborhoods.

^{*}Four Corners in Lowell, MA provided safe, therapeutic, short-term residential placement for male and female youth age 12-18. The program served youth and families struggling with issues that include emotional disturbance, trauma, family conflict and behavioral issues such as truancy, running and substance abuse (http://www.nfima.org/services/behavioral-health/four-corners). These statistics are through August 29, 2018 as Four Corners closed at that time. Residents from Four Corners were transferred to **Riverview** located at 475 Varnum **Avenue**.

^{**}The GRIP Program is a co-ed intensive group home for transitional age adolescents 16-22. Our mission is to support our youth educationally, vocationally, and socially to make healthy choices and become independent while providing a safe and nurturing environment (https://jri.org/services/educational-and-residential/group-homes/grip).



METHODOLOGY/ LIMITATIONS

The data contained throughout this analysis was collected through the LPD Records Management System, Larimore, and by means of the Crime Analysis/Intelligence Unit's database. Statistics by crime type (Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Car Breaks, Vandalism), were then matched to those reported to the National Incident-based Reporting System (NIBRS). NIBRS statistics are compiled solely by the LPD Records **Division**.

Statistics contained within this report are subject to change due to ongoing investigations.

CAD data presented within this report does not include Fire Calls.

Use caution when interpreting racial identification statistics, as it is not always reported accurately.

Opioid Overdose statistics gathered by LPD are based on evidence at the scene, as detailed within the police report. If evidence is consistent with Heroin/Opioid use, i.e. hypodermic needles present, Opioid pill bottles, or evidence of prior intravenous drug use, these cases are included. Cocaine overdoses in which Narcan revived the victim are also included, as Fentanyl has been found in this substance. Therefore, statistics should be interpreted with caution, and will not be consistent with Trinity or that from the Department of Public Health.

Opioid related Sudden Death statistics are based on details at the scene (same as above). Therefore, Opioid Sudden Death statistics should be interpreted with caution, and are not an official cause of death from the medical examiner. This data will not be consistent with the Department of Public Health data.

Gang related incidents include only those members that self admit membership, or have been identified by the LPD, and are suspected to be gang involved.

Firearm activity only includes incidents in which the use of the firearm was verified by evidence.

The Domestic Assault section contains raw data that has not been filtered to meet NIBRS standards, therefore, assault statistics will not match citywide Aggravated Assault information.


The citation system was added to Crimeview in 2015, which now allows CAIU to pull this information. Data from years prior were stored in a different system and is not comparable at this time.


Split time is defined as the median time between the start point and end point (i.e. the beginning of a stretch of time when a crime could have occurred if the exact time is unknown).

LPD responded to 92,478 CAD Entries in 2018. This number reflects a 6% decrease when compared to 2017, which recorded 98,034 CAD Entries. 2018 statistics have declined 11% over the 5 year period, and are below the 5 year average of 96,125.

Medical Calls (n=18,873) and Traffic/MV Charges (n=12,680) have the highest call volume. Disturbance Calls have decreased 3%, from 5,224 in 2017 to 5,065 in 2018. See Disturbance Calls by Type above for detailed frequencies.

Homicides have declined 33% over the 5-year period and are above the 5-year average of 2.2. The four homicides included: (1) A female gang associate, who shot the victim in a road rage incident. (2) Involved family members and people known to one another, which possibly started over a girl. (3) Was the result of a double shooting of 2 gang members, one who died on scene. (4) Involved parties know to one another, and was the result of a Robbery gone bad.






Over the 5 –year period, incidents of Forcible Rape have declined (-15%). In 2018, there were 22 incidents of Forcible Rape which reflects a 100% increase from the 11 reported in 2017.

Regardless of year, Forcible Rape incidents appear to increase in the warmer weather months. Currently 5 of the 22 cases have been cleared by an Arrest (n=2), Complaint (n=2), or Other Clearance (n=1). The remaining 18 continue to be open and under investigation.

Thirty –two percent of the reported victims were juveniles (17 and under). The average age of the victim was 27 years of age. In regards to relationship between the victim and offender, the majority were acquaintances (n=8), followed by ex-dating partners (n=4), a person the victim met online (n=3), a neighbor (n=3), family member (n=2), and in 2 cases the perpetrator was unknown.

Other variables noted, in three cases the victim felt as if they passed out, or had been given some type of drug. Another victim stated that she was assaulted by several males who were gang members.








Since 2014, Robberies have gradually been on a downward trend (-43%). In 2018, there were 105 incidents of Robbery reported in the City of Lowell, which reflects a 27% decrease when compared to 2017.


When comparing 2017-2018 Robbery by city District, District B1 was the only area showing an increase (5%). Districts A1 (-7%), A2 (-34%), and B2 (-8%) all had decreases.




When reviewing the time the Robberies are occurring, based on split time (refer to page 5 for a complete definition), 54% of the incidents occurred on Platoon 3, while 28% are on Platoon 1 and 18% on Platoon 2.

Incidents predominantly took place on Platoon 3 (54%), and over the weekends (52%). Wednesdays also had a higher number (n= 16). Platoon 3 weekend Robberies coincide with the most problematic neighborhoods, Lower Highlands, Centralville, and Downtown.









Of the 105 Robberies reported, 51% were cleared. Twenty-five percent were cleared by arrest, 22% were cleared by a Complaint/Summons, and 5% were cleared by a Warrant/ other Clearance.

Forty-six percent of the Robberies were Armed and 54% were Unarmed. Of the Armed Robberies, 23% listed a Firearm being used, 16% listed a Knife/Cutting Instrument being used, and 7% listed "Other" or an Implied weapon used.

Seventy-one percent of the Robberies reported were Street Robberies and 29% were Commercial Robberies. District B-2 had the largest number of Street Robberies occur, while District A-2 had the largest number of Commercial Robberies.

Robbery's further broken down by location type show the majority were Street (n=52), followed by Retail Store (n=21), Residence (n=11), Park (n=7), Delivery Driver (n=6), Parking lot (n=3), Restaurant/Bar (n=2), and Bank (n=1).

Other variables of note:

- The stores robbed multiple times include the following: 7-11 (Gorham St), 7-11 (Mammoth Rd), Chucks Variety, and Country Farm.
- The park most impacted by Robberies was South Common.
- Five incidents revolved around the use of electronic market places (LetGo/ FB Market Place).
- Six of the Robberies were Home Invasions.
- Six incidents were Purse Snatchings, which took place in the Lower Highlands (n=4), and Acre (n=2).




In 2018, there were a total of 189 incidents of Aggravated Assault, which reflects a 36% increase when compared to 2017. Over the five year period, Aggravated Assaults have declined 49% from 372 in 2014 to 189 in 2018. Of the 189 incidents in 2018, 39% (n=54) were Domestic-related. See page 26 for a full analysis of Domestic Violence in the City of Lowell.


2018 Aggravated Assaults started and ended the year following the 2017 trend. However the months of March-August, with the exception of May, had a higher number of incidents which drove the increase.

Incidents were divided equally (50/50) between Sectors A and B. Specifically, Aggravated Assaults primarily took place in the Acre Neighborhood (16%), followed by Centralville (15%), Downtown (13%), and Lower Highlands (13%). Incidents in the Acre increased 107% from 15 in 2017 to 31 in 2018.

Platoon 3 is the busiest time period for Aggravated Assaults (49%), followed by Platoon 1 (30%), and Platoon 2 (21%). No pattern by day of week.









AGGRAVATED ASSAULT CONTINUED

The Aggravated Assault clearance rate is approximately 80%, with Arrests made in 64% of the cases almost immediately, and 16% through either a Complaint/Warrant.

Thirty-four percent of the Aggravated Assaults involved the use of a Knife/Cutting Instrument, followed by Hands, Fist, or Feet (25%), Other Dangerous Weapon (19%), Handgun (18%), Blunt Instrument (4%), and BB Gun (less than 1%).


Twenty four percent (n=44) of victims were in the age range of 18-24 years old, followed by 45-54 years old with 17% (n=31). Victims falling within the age range of 65+ had the fewest incidents with 1% (n=2).


During 2018, the City of Lowell had a total of 348 Burglaries reported. This number reflects a 27% decrease when compared to 2017, and a 12% increase when compared over the 5 year period.


The months of May (n=39), July (n=34), Nov (n=33), and February (n=32) had the highest number of Burglaries.


Burglaries were split between Sector A (n=177), and Sector B (n=171). The most problematic neighborhoods for Burglary are Centralville (n=60), Highlands (n=41), Downtown (n=40), and Back Central (n=40).

Burglaries were split relatively evenly by Platoon: Platoon 1 (n=122), Platoon 2 (n=107), and Platoon 3 (n=119). Similarly incidents were reported consistently by day, with Mondays having the largest frequency (n=60).

Sixty-four percent of the reported Burglaries were Residential (n=222), 13% were Commercial (n=46), and 23% were Other locations (n=80). Other includes: College, Church, Synagogue, Temple/Mosque, Storage facility, Doctors Office/Drug Store/Hospital, Construction site, and Bus/Train terminal.









BURGLARY CONTINUED

Out of the total Burglaries reported, 53% (n=184) were Forcibly Entered, 27% (n=94) were Unlawfully Entered, 12% (n=43) were Unknown Entries, and 8% (n=27) were Attempted Entries.

In the majority of Burglaries, point of entry was made through the door (n=180) or window (n=95).

Thirty percent of all the Burglaries were cleared, specifically by Arrest (n=87), Complaint (n=4), and Warrant/Other Clearance (n=13).






When looking at the time the Car Breaks are occurring, based on split time, 53% of the incidents are occurring on Platoon 1, while 26% are on Platoon 3, and 20% on Platoon 2. These percentages are similar to 2017.

Platoon 1 is the busiest time for Car Breaks regardless of Day of week, however Friday through Tuesdays appear to have the most incidents occur. Platoon 2 has the least amount of incidents occur however Monday on Platoon 2 had a higher number of incidents.

Of the 281 Car Breaks that occurred in 2018, 56% were Non-Forcible Entry, 23% were Unknown Entry, 19% were Forcible Entry, and 1% were Attempted Entry.

Car Break Clearance rate was 10% for the year 2018. Sixty nine percent were cleared by an arrest, 28% by Complaint, and 3% by Warrant.




During 2018, the City of Lowell had a total of 751 Vandalism incidents reported. This shows a 13% (n=111) decrease when compared to 2017 and a 32% decrease over the 5-year period.


All months with the exception of May, showed a decrease when compared to 2017.

Incidents of Vandalism were split by city Sector: Sector A (n=387), and Sector B (n=364). Specifically, Centralville had the highest number of incidents with 17% (n=127), followed by the Acre with 14% (n=107), and Downtown with 13% (n=99). The Lower Highlands (-24%) and Highlands (-23%) neighborhoods saw significant decreases when compared to 2017.










PROPERTY CRIME MAP

In regards to drug classification, many cases included multiple classes of drugs. For the purpose of this analysis, drug class was organized by the primary drug. In the majority of cases, persons were arrested for Class B (49%), and Class A (33%).



DRUG ARRESTS CONTINUED

Of the individuals arrested for Drug Charges, approximately 67% were under the age of 34. Offenders in most cases were male (84%), and either Hispanic (41%) or White (33%).

Of those arrested, 62% were residents of Lowell, down from 77% the prior year. Thirteen-percent listed themselves as Homeless. The remaining 25% were from outside of Lowell. Those from outside Lowell were from the following Massachusetts communities: Bedford, Billerica, Boston, Brookline, Burlington, Chelmsford, Dracut, Haverhill, Lawrence, Lynn, Methuen, N Andover, Tewksbury,

Wakefield, and Watertown. Those from out of state were from the following areas: Cranston, RI, Derry, NH, Hudson, NH, Lawrenceville, GA, Nashua, NH, Providence, RI, Salem, NH, and Vernon, CT.

Drug arrests take place throughout the week, primarily on Platoon 3 (63%).

The number of drug arrests per month was between 12 and 26, with the majority of arrests taking place May -September.

Arrests primarily took place in Centralville (n=56), Lower Highlands (n=39), Acre (n=30), Downtown (n=28) and Back Central (n=28).




In 2018, the LPD responded to 435 Opioid Overdoses, a decrease of 7% (n=32) when compared to 2017. Overdose statistics are based on information gathered at the scene by the responding officer, and are not consistent with City of Lowell overdose statistics provided by Trinity. Please refer to the Methodology section on page 5 for a full explanation.


In 75% of the cases, Narcan was listed within the police report as being administered. Narcan could have been administered by LPD, Lowell Fire Department (LFD), Trinity Emergency Medical Services (EMS), or a citizen on scene prior to emergency services arriving.

Downtown (n=78), Back Central (n=72), Acre (n=63), and Centralville (n=63) had the highest number of overdoses. When comparing 2018 Overdoses to the prior year, the only neighborhoods to increase were Pawtucketville 47%, and Back Central 31%. Centralville has the largest decrease, from 94 in 2017 to 63 in 2018.

In 2018, there were on average 11 overdoses a week. Approximately 46% of the Opioid Overdoses took place on Platoon 3, followed by Platoon 2 (35%), and Platoon 1 (17%). When looking across Day of Week, there was no real trend other than a slightly lesser number of overdoses take place on Wednesdays.




In 2018, there were a total of 53 Sudden Deaths attributed to an Opioid Overdose. This statistic reflects a 15% increase when compared to 2017. 
The Acre (n=10), Centralville (n=10), Back Central (n=7), and Lower Highlands (n=7) had the highest number of Overdose deaths. Downtown, which was the hotspot in 2017, decreased from 10 to 4.

Officers on Platoon 2 responded to the majority of the overdose fatalities (n=21), followed by Platoon 3 (n=18), and Platoon 1 (n=14). There was no pattern as far as day of week. The highest number of fatalities took place on Thursdays (n=12), and Mondays (n=9).

Victims are more often than not male (75%), with a mean age of 41. Thirteen victims were 30 years old or younger, with one as young as 19. Victims were also more likely to be found deceased at the same location they resided (83%). Five victims were listed as homeless, and 4 from out of town/state (Byfield, Dracut, Peabody, and Westford, MA).







In 2018, 3,461 Domestic Incidents were reported in the City of Lowell. The majority of these incidents were Domestic Arguments (54%, n=1,873). Twenty-one percent of Domestic-related incidents were Simple Assaults (n=736), and 7% were Aggravated Assaults (n=236). Violations of Restraining Orders (not concurrent with another criminal act) accounted for 4% of the Domestic Incidents (n=122). The remaining 14% is comprised of a variety of crimes including Burglaries, Disturbances, Harassment, Intimidation of a Witness, Threats, Auto Theft, Credit Card Fraud, Vandalism, etc. (n=494).




Of the 972 Domestic Assaults, 75% were Simple Assaults (n=736) and 25% were Aggravated Assaults (n=236).


Domestic Assaults were split relatively evenly between Sector A (47%) and Sector B (53%). Specifically the Centralville (n=183) and the Acre (n=121) neighborhoods drive the numbers in Sector A. Whereas number of incidents in Sector B are spread out across neighborhoods, with the exception of South Lowell and Belvidere.

Platoon 3 had the highest number of incidents (58%), with Saturday (n=175) being the day with the most frequent number of incidents.

Ninety-nine percent of Domestic Assaults were cleared by Arrest, Warrant, or Court Proceedings. Officers made arrests in 685 of the 972 Assaults, or in 70% of the cases. Dual arrests were made in three incidents because officers deemed both parties to be aggressive and combative towards each other. Complaint Applications requesting either a warrant or a hearing were sought in 272 incidents or 28% of the time. The 1% un-cleared Domestic Assault cases can primarily be attributed to an officer not receiving enough identifying information (i.e. correct name, DOB, address, etc.) on the suspect, either because the victim did not know it or is refusing to cooperate.









DOMESTIC ASSAULT CONTINUED

The most prevalent age range of both victims and offenders was 18-29 years old, with 35% of all offenders, and 33% of all victims falling within these parameters (2% of victims/offenders had no age listed).

Forty-six percent of offenders and 51% of victims were White. Twenty-seven percent of offenders and 28% of victims were Hispanic. Fourteen percent of offenders and 10% of victims were Black. Nine percent of offenders and 9% of victims were Asian. One percent of both offenders and victims fall into the "other" category (i.e. Indian, Middle-Eastern, etc.). Finally, both 2% of offender's and victim's races were unknown (there are at times multiple victims/ offenders for each case).

Forty-two percent of Domestic Assaults occurred between people in a significant dating relationship (n=407), followed by Parent/Child relationships (n=147 or 15%), Ex Dating Partners (n=130 or 13%), Spouses (n=117 or 12%), Siblings (n=66 or 7%), Other Family (n=64 or 6%), Roommates (n=54 or 5%), and Ex Spouses (n=8 or 1%). In some cases there is more than one victim therefore numbers exceed 982.



JUVENILE ARRESTS

Juvenile arrests were more prevalent in the Centralville neighborhood (n=36), followed by the Downtown (n=27), and the Acre (n=13).


The number of Firearm involved incidents began to increase to its highest point in April, then declined slightly in May/June before again increasing in July.






On average, there are approximately 27 gang related incidents per month. Gang activity surpassed that number for several months, with February having the highest number (n=52).
